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Hyogo Framework for Action 2005-2015:

Building the resilience of nations and communities to disasters

Five priorities for action

- Governance: ensure that disaster risk reduction is a national and local priority with strong institutional basis for implementation
- Risk identification: identify, assess and monitor disaster risks and enhance early warning
- 3. Reducing the underlying risk factors in various sectors (environment, health, construction, etc.)
- 4. **Knowledge:** use knowledge, innovation and education to build a culture of safety and resilience at all levels
- 5. Strengthen disaster preparedness for effective response





Enhancement of Emergency Response (PEER 3) from 2009 - 2014

Asian Disaster Preparedness Centre will undertake the 60 months project, Enhancement of Emergency Response (PEER 3) from 2009 - 2014. The key objectives of the project are to enhance disaster response capacity, reduce mortality, and increase the survival rate of disaster victims at all levels in nine (9) Asian countries, namely, Bangladesh, India, Indonesia, Nepal, Pakistan, Philippines, Cambodia, Lao PDR, Vietnam; to establish system for enhancing community-level first responder capacity in disaster-prone communities in the six PEER program countries and to improve the capacity of hospitals and medical facilities to be prepared to manage emergencies and mass casualty events in non-PEER countries in Asia.

World Health Day 2009

Save lives. Make hospitals safe in emergencies



World Health Day 2009 focuses on the safety of health facilities and the readiness of health workers who treat those affected by emergencies. Health centres and staff are critical life-lines for vulnerable people in disasters treating injuries, preventing illnesses and caring for people's health needs.

They are cornerstones for primary health care in communities -meeting everyday needs, such as safe childbirth services, immunizations and chronic disease care that must continue in emergencies. Often, already fragile health systems are unable to keep functioning through a disaster, with

immediate and future public health consequences.



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





















Established by Interministerial decree in February 2001 and re-established in August 2003 by Prime minister decree, the COPRNM is under the responsibility of the Minister of Ecology and Sustainable Development.

Members

- 1. President: a personality chosen by the Minister of Ecology and Sustainable Development,
- 2. Representatives of the ministries belonging to the Interministerial Committee for Sustainable Development,
- 3. Twelve elected members (six members of parliament, six mayors or presidents of communities).
- 4. Ten qualified personalities chosen by the ministries, among them the president of AFPCN (a special agreement exists between AFPCN and Ministry of Ecology and Sustainable Development).

The secretariat of the council is headed by the Delegate for Major. Risks, who is the focal point for ISDR. The council meets once or twice










In July 2009, UNISDR is organizing a series of meetings in the region of Central Asia, namely, a National Platform workshop in Astana, Kazakhstan, (July 24-25 2009) and multi-stakeholder meetings in Bishkek, Kyrgyzstan, (July 27 2009) and Dushanbe, Tajikistan, (July 30-31 2009).

Members of the national platform of Kazakhstan and the national mechanisms for coordination of DRR in Kyrgyzstan and Tajikistan will have two-day intensive exchange of information, group work and forward-looking discussions and action planning. The entire activity will be facilitated by UNSDR Secretariat offices in Geneva and Central Asia.

The overall goal of the workshops is enhancing effectiveness of coordination, planning and implementation of the Hyogo Framework for Action disaster risk reduction.
