

Why Emergency Preparedness Planning (EPP)?

To Respond Faster

- Know capacity and strengths
- Identify internal and some external constraints and challenges
- Clarify Roles and Responsibilities
- Put in place measures that improve

To Enhance Resource base for Faster Response Based on the humanitarian ambition of the partner

- Identify potential donors and other Stakeholders
- Approach and Negotiate potential donors and other stakeholders

To Improve Quality

- Strengthen coordination
- Build capacity of staff and partners
- Improve Partnerships
- Review systems and support functions

Emergency Preparedness Planning v's Contingency Planning

	Emergency Preparedness Planning	Contingency Planning
Focus	Specific emergency preparedness actions are identified and planned for	Specific scenarios (emergencies) are developed, with a plan focused on responding to these scenarios
	Prepare for ANY emergency	Prepare for a SPECIFIC emergency
Elements	Largely internally focused (ways of working, systems, processes, roles and responsibilities)	Externally and internally focused
	Unknown - nature and scale of emergency not assumed	Known - anticipating the nature and scale of the emergency
	When no specific threat is identified	When specific and detailed planning is needed
Best Used	When preparing for difficult-to-predict, rapid on-set disasters (e.g. earthquakes)	When a specific threat or emerging crisis exists
Pitfalls	Can be too focused on preparedness, without a plan to respond to the emergency	Can be too detailed and prone to the 'scenario trap'
	Can be too broad and lacking the detail needed to respond adequately	Scenarios are often wide off the mark
Who uses them	Also very common among humanitarian actors.	Most common form of contingency planning among humanitarian actors.
THIO GOES HICH	Used by donors, NGOs, UN agencies, national governments and NGOs	Used by donors, NGOs, UN agencies, national governments and NGOs
